It is an honor to uphold the foundation of Providence lent to us by Jack Hutton, Sister Frieda Raab, Jack Pearce, and Devon Mills (founding members) and the tremendous efforts of all those who came alongside them since 1979.

Providence Farm serves those most vulnerable in the Cowichan Valley. We are a Trauma Informed agency, providing adult Community Inclusion Day programs through a Person-Centered lens. Our application of practice is celebrated in Nature Based and Horticultural Therapies. In 2023 - 2024 Providence Farm provided opportunities for growth and healing to over 100 participants, individuals with diverse abilities and needs through contract supported referrals (CLBC and VIHA).

Together we steward the earth and care for each other, creating opportunities for renewal and learning in safe and supportive spaces by working with the land.

#### Dear Members,

There has never been a better time to be at Providence Farm, whether as a board member, staff member, participant or volunteer. The vibe is happy and productive, the farm looks good, the harvest has been productive, and the board has accomplished a lot. All of this is reflected in our social media, so I hope that you are following us on Facebook!

In this AGM package, you will learn about many of the exciting things that have been taking place on the Farm. Although the Board of Directors undertakes the distinctly unexciting work of governance for this great organization, we are proud of our accomplishments also. In 2023-24, we have:

**Reviewed** our strategic plan for 2021-2024, and celebrated our accomplishments within that period of time (more than 50% of the actions outlined in the Plan were completed within the plan period, and more were underway);

**Drafted** a new strategic plan for 2025-2028 (4 years), which is focused on the key areas of programming, land management, organizational financial stability, and becoming a more inclusive organization;

**Adopted** Providence Farm's Forest Management Plan, where the forest will be managed based on our commitment to protect its ecological, therapeutic, and cultural values, with the aim of supporting the forest to become an old forest. We have a precious fragment of the endangered Coastal Douglas-fir ecosystem in our hands to steward effectively. This stewardship also requires resources to manage it, so with the support of some angel investors, we are exploring carbon credit options to generate those resources;





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**Adopted** an investment policy. Members may remember that last year we made a bylaw change, to eliminate the specificity of the restrictions on how Providence Farm invests. There are new investment tools out there today that the bylaws did not anticipate. Working together with knowledgeable advisors, VIPCA now has a policy that permits us to invest any reserves, windfalls, restricted donations, or endowment funds in conservative, yet effective, ways to ensure that those funds do not lose value simply due to inflation;

**Adopted** a capital plan, outlining our key priorities for capital improvements on the Farm, which include:

- Undertaking CTRA Barn repairs and renovations,
- Upgrading the safety and accessibility of Providence House,
- Relocating the driveway, and
- Converting the lower floor of the McKinnon Building to support program delivery.

There truly has never been a better time to be at the Farm, and we encourage our members to join us for our celebrations and fundraising events, or join us as volunteers, whether working in the Fix-It Shop or on the Board of Directors.

Together, we promote belonging by standing alongside individuals, meeting them where they are and as they are.

With open hearts, we continue to encourage a future that actively fosters healing and trust as we move forward together.



## Our Therapeutic **Programming**

Never underestimate the resilience gifted to us through nature, community, trust, friendship, and love.

Our 2023-24 Providence and Extended Farmily Members demonstrated strong and innovative spirits by maximizing the opportunities set into motion following last year's period of reflection and calm. Programs continued to refine and analyze our approach to Nature-Based Practice, using measurable objectives gathered from the previous year's insights. The Case Management team excelled with the completion of Person-Centered Care Plan rubrics, and we attracted talents from both near and far to join our team. We facilitated professional development training centered on themes of trust and appreciation and continued to pursue the realization of CARF accreditation.

Our confidence in the research and evidence-based practices of Positive Psychology, coupled with our appreciation for the power of neuroplasticity, has driven our success in deconstructing the negative impacts of COVID-19 in our community. This success is evidenced by outstanding and consistent participant attendance, high retention rates, lower anxiety levels, increased engagement, and improvements in self-efficacy and autonomy. The continued efficacy of this practice has become the best possible contagion; infectious smiles, laughter, testimonies of accomplishment, and expressions of love are the welcomed 'plagues' we see every day.

In 2023, we continued to pilot, assess, and shape our Person-Centered Care Plans in collaboration with participants and staff. We actively sought feedback from our participants as stakeholders to ensure that their personal goals were accurately reflected, captured, and reported. This process required thoughtful consideration, patience, and time. Providence supports a diverse range of abilities and cognitive functioning, including individuals with neurodivergence (Autism), developmental disabilities, and those navigating traumatic brain injuries.

Creating a document that serves such a wide spectrum of abilities presented challenges, as it was crucial to develop an approach that was respectful, dignified, and inclusive of all. It required careful adaptation to ensure that language and structure were accessible and empowering, accommodating the needs of each individual while upholding their dignity. With the insightful perspectives and expertise of our Case Management team, we developed a document that embodies Providence's commitment to inclusivity and accessibility, which is now proudly implemented.

"Nature-Based Practitioners, encompassing our entire Providence team, were inspired to engage in training that aligned with the leadership team's shared vision of building layers of trust internally and externally to promote stability and ensure sustainability. Cliff Thorbes led an invaluable workshop based on the Personality Dimensions series, offering an emotional exploration of our strengths and perceived areas for growth. This workshop fostered deep connection, camaraderie, and insight into how we can collaborate to maximize both our personal and professional agency and potential. Providence continues to cultivate a positive work culture grounded in the core values of our FARMILY."

Illuminating the power and strength found in collaboration reflects the essence and success of Providence Farm's legacy. The principle that 'nothing works alone in nature' guided our programming efforts in 2023-24, as we planted the seeds of collaboration to nurture relationships and cultivate partnerships designed to reap a reciprocal harvest, nourishing not just ourselves but our extended Farmily. This year, we emphasized sustainability and trust in one another, recognizing the strength that comes from working together. Our partnerships with land partners like CTRA (Cowichan Therapeutic Riding Association) enabled us to explore program expansion opportunities through Equine Assisted Learning. We also facilitated shared learning experiences through services or internships with universities, including Camosun College of Horticulture, University of Victoria (MA SW), and VIU Human Services Programs. Additionally, we benefited from the invaluable consultation and support of our friends at Glenora Farm, Clements Center, and NACL (Nanaimo Association for Community Living). These collaborations have become integral to our mission, ensuring a legacy of sustainability and shared growth.

# Our Finance and Fund Development

Community is an integral part of what makes us thrive at Providence Farm, and the financial operations of our organization are no exception. Our partnerships with community referral agencies—such as those focused on brain injuries, mental health, community inclusion programs, and senior services—provide us with a consistent base of funding and connect us with individuals who need our support. Our commitment to addressing the needs of the Cowichan Valley remains at the forefront of our efforts.

While we greatly appreciate the support from these community agencies, the operational costs of managing 400 acres of forest and agricultural lands, and 96,000 square feet of infrastructure, far exceed the prescribed service delivery rates outlined in our contracts. With our mission-driven goal to steward the land in a sustainable way we look to the broader community for assistance in covering the expenses necessary to ensure Providence Farm remains a vital community asset for decades to come.

With this long-term vision in mind, the 2023/24 fiscal year saw significant efforts dedicated to the development of a long-range capital plan. Once completed, this plan will help us address the infrastructure needs of the Farm, ensuring both short-term solutions and long-term sustainability for our organization and the many community partners who utilize the Farm for our mutual benefit.

Additionally, the 2023/24 fiscal year marked the completion of our Forest Management plan. With this comprehensive document in place, our focus now shifts to the operational management of the forest and surrounding land. By taking an ecosystems-based approach, we recognize the importance of community support and partnerships in managing the expenses associated with healthy forest stewardship.

As we work towards large-scale projects and capital investments, we are confident that our relationships with the broader community will continue to flourish, presenting new opportunities for partnership and support.

## Our Site and Agriculture

The 2023-2024 fiscal year was marked by our efforts to balance the maintenance of aging infrastructure with the advancement of new and innovative projects that address the evolving accessibility needs of the community we serve. This year the board of directors prioritized the importance of managing our extremely rare coastal Douglas fir ecosystem, which resulted in the development of a forest management plan and the commencement of its initial implementation steps.

The St. Ann Gazebo is a much-loved area for our participants to enjoy and serves as the backdrop for many of the weddings that take place in the gardens each year. With generous support through the New Horizons Grant our team was able to increase the footprint of the St. Ann gazebo, increasing its accessibility, while replacing critical structural components of roof system. This project will ensure this structure will be utilized for programming and events long into the future.

Accessibility continues to be of paramount importance as we strive to create an inclusive space for all those who experience Providence Farm. To ensure those who use wheelchairs or walkers can enjoy the therapeutic benefits of gardening in the greenhouse the site team collaborated with participants and staff to design and build a wheelchair accessible raised bed from locally sourced cedar. The raised bed is U-shaped and allows the wheelchair user to sit underneath a portion of the bed so they can access the bed on three sides. Projects of this nature are truly inspiring and serve to galvanize our team toward the shared goal of inclusivity. Big thank you to Veridian Energy for their financial support.

As we experience a warming climate and local annual precipitation declining the risk of wildfire has increased dramatically. With the creation of our forest management plan the board of directors has identified key steps to protecting the ecological, programmatic and cultural aspects of forested lands we steward. One such step, funded by a local angel investor, completed in 2023 was the clearing of the mount Tzouhalem trails. With the help of Khowutzun Forest Service a significant portion of the trails were cleared, making it possible for emergency services to access the mountain in case of fire. Trail access will also allow future work such as thinning an overgrown Christmas tree plantation, removing fuel from the forest floor and selective pruning to reduce the risk of a surface fire transitioning to a canopy fire.

The work we engage in at Providence Farm can at times be incredibly challenging, in these moments I am reminded what an honour it is to aid in the stewardship of these lands, and be a part of this vibrant, growing community!


